Kammer made his debut surreptitiously at the age of 10, smuggled into the former Berger's Tap to perform with Johnny Clendenen and the Impalas. It didn't take long for

other musicians to realize he was an exceptionally talented kid. His drumming and singing were also featured with

Milt Campbell and the Country Buddies, followed by The Plainsmen, and The New Beginning.

According to Kammer's page on the website: hubcitymusic.cloudmurphy.com, he moved into the rock style of music playing with popular

bands Blue Horizon and Shatter. Other rock bands included The Blitz Brothers, The Basics, and The Bruce Bearinger Band. Not wanting to get stuck in just

According to a report from the Fayette County Sheriff, about 10:15 p.m., a deputy responded to a 911 hang up call in the 9000 block of Golden Road just East of West Union. Once the deputy

arrived he was confronted by a disorderly subject who was identified as Terry Scott Mork, 53, of West Union

Mork was charged with Criminal Trespassing (Simple Misdemeanor), Interference with Official Acts (Simple Misdemeanor), and Assault on a Peace Officer ("D" Felony), and transported to the Fayette County Jail where he later posted \$8500 bond.
